School red jumper or cardigan








All items must be plain, except for the school jumper or cardigan which can have the school logo.

'Tapjacking' - Scam

Tapjacking literally means someone hijacking what a user taps on his smartphone.

This bizarrely named scam will trick you into clicking and performing actions on your phone or device without even realising it.

It works by showing you an overlay, which you think is clickable - but it's not. It's just a false screen designed to obscure the thing you're actually clicking on.

For example, you may think you're playing a skill-based mobile game, but the gaming elements on screen are just a cover. Far from earning points in the game, your clicks are actually being applied to an invisible screen beneath, where you're unwittingly making in-app purchases or being signed up to a rolling monthly subscription.

To minimise the risk of falling victim to these scams, only install apps from reputable app stores such as App Store or Google Play Store, and read user reviews before downloading.





Children may be persuaded to download apps whilst on websites, via pop-ups or during their games. Ensure they know how to download safe apps from legitimate stores and that your financial details are secure.

If you do find unknown charges on your account, speak to your bank in the first instance to ensure no further charges can be made.






Year 3 RE - What happens if we do wrong?

Over the Spring half term, Year 3 were studying how different religions view wrong-doing, repentance and forgiveness. We looked at Christianity, Islam and Hinduism. For our final lesson, the children played a board game to deepen their understanding of the Hindu worldview. At the end of each life, they could choose a karma card which moved them forwards or backwards in their next life.







Year 3 Art - 3D Sculpture

In the second spring term, Year 3 looked at sculpture. We learned about some artists and their abstract sculptures, such as Anthony Caro. Working in groups, the children created large scale **abstract** sculptures using cardboard and a variety of skills such as folding, balancing and rolling. They had to investigate the best way to join the materials.

Year 3 Geography - Volcanic Eruptions

Year 3 - REDSTART









Year 4 - D.T Day - Slingshot Cars


Before the Easter break, Year 4 held their D.T day. We researched, designed and built our own slingshot cars. During our research, we looked at how different cars are designed for practical purposes and for speed and entertainment. When designing, we looked at rally cars and created our own graphics to represent our teams.

Before the Easter Holidays, Mrs Pommills and Ms Stacey hid some Easter Eggs around the playground for us—we had lots of fun searching for them and then swapping them for some Easter treats.



Year 5 - Art

In Art, we have been learning about portraits and thinking about how we would represent ourselves in portraits. We started off by creating portrait poems, using different media and then completing a mixed media portrait at the end of the unit. Here are some examples of our work.













Year 5 - English Hook Lesson

On the first day back after the Easter holidays, we were asked to collect data about each other and record it. We then had a debate about whether or not data should be collected on people and how it should be used, stored and shared. We then began reading out new text, Robot Girl by Malorie Blackman, and found out that the main character's data had been used by her dad to create a robot.











Year 5 - Hampton Court Palace



Year 6 - National Art Gallery



In Art, we asked the children to study the famous 'The Scream' painting by Edvard Munch and focus on the expression created. The children then practise their (silent!) screams, thinking about what would make them scream and practising their pose. From there they chose up to four famous paintings to recreate individually or in groups using tablets. To help consolidate their learning and study other famous portraits, Year 6 took a trip to the National Art Gallery in Trafalgar Square.


Year 6 - Science: Energy- Circuits, Batteries and Switches Experiment


In Science, The children had to draw out the components in a circuit diagram, add a prediction for whether they think the circuit would work and build and test it so they can record the outcome. Then, the children had to construct a circuit with one cell and one bulb to test if the equipment works, then take it apart, ready to begin. They had to justify why a circuit has or has not worked. Next, they had to record at least one circuit that has worked and one that has not. Finally, the children feedback about what is needed to make a circuit work and any other observations they made. In pairs, they shared positives about their partner's circuit diagrams by looking for correct circuit symbols, using a pencil and ruler or making the overall shape rectangular.














Class P.E. Days

Attendance and Punctuality





Gates **open at 8.35am and close at 8.45am**. After this time, children will need to be bought into school via the main office.

All children arriving once the school gate is locked MUST enter the school via the school office.

Parents will be asked to give a reason for their lateness.

At **8:55am**, the school registers are closed, any children arriving in the class room after this time will be marked as late in the class register (L). At **9:25am**, any children arriving in the school office after this time will be marked as late and **unauthorised** in the class register (U).

The **end of the school day, 3.15pm**, remains the same and we appreciate your support in collecting the children on time. Children not collected by 3.25pm will be taken to the school office for collection.

Morning Break Snacks

Please ensure you are not sending your children into school with any sweets, crisps, biscuits, chocolate or energy drinks.











We are promoting healthy eating and to support this have limited the morning snacks to fruit, yoghurt, cheese snacks and **nut free** cereal bars. **If your child brings the wrong type of snack to school, you will receive a reminder text about this.**
